Nixon is visited in the White House by Sen. Hugh Scott and other unnamed "prominent senators," who tell him that unless he changes his policy of ignoring Watergate, six conservative Republican senators will not seek re-election when their terms are up in 1974. (The six are Aiken, Bellmon, Cook, Cotton, Dominick, Saxbe.) Ford also has told Nixon that Watergate fallout might spell disaster for Republican candidates unless Nixon takes some specific action.
