Nixon (deal?) - Elliot Richardson suggested [no date] that an informal agreement between the leadership of Congress, the Attorney General and Special Prosecutor Leon Jaworski ^{AMP-A} could be the basis of an understanding on which 'the President could rely, even though it wouldn't have the force of law.'"

Ⓐ - "Within minutes of the resignation speech, Leon Jaworski pointedly announced that so far as Nixon's immunity from criminal prosecution was concerned, 'the special prosecutor's office was not asked for any agreement . . . and offered none.'"

"On the facts, the possibility of his indictment and prosecution is serious. Technically speaking, 'the decision is Mr. Jaworski's,' said Attorney General William Saxbe. For so momentous a matter, Jaworski is sure to seek guidance from Congress and President Ford, though a Jaworski spokesman indicated that the need for a decision was 'not immediate.' The case for prosecution is clear, however."
