Nixon (resignation) - David Eisenhower says Nixon "didn't intend resignation as an admission of guilt, just of exhaustion."

He says Nixon would have preferred going through the impeachment process to resigning, but did not want "to put the country through all of that. The basic struggle was political from the outset, and politically he stood convicted."

He says that for the family, after "a year and a half" (?) of Watergate, it was a relief when Nixon finally decided to resign.

Eisenhower's views are given in a copyrighted story in the Philadelphia Sunday Bulletin, but from AP's account it is unclear whether the story was written by him or based on an interview of him. Eisenhower was a "contributing" sports columnistfor the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin, early May through 26 Aug 73.
