Nixon (pardon) - Undated story on suit by F. Gregory Murphy asking that Nixon's pardon be declared null and void; story does not report his arguments. He is an attorney of Marquette, Michigan.

U.S. District Judge Noel Fox, in Grand Rapids, says Nixon was a "putative rebel leader" whose administration apparently was engaged in "an insurrection and rebellion against constitutional government itself," but he rules that Ford's pardon of Nixon was constitutional.

"Judge Fox based his rulin, in part, on the Federalist No. 74, written by Alexander Hamilton in 1788 in support of the then-proposed Constitution.

"Hamilton argued that a president's pardoning power should be unrestricted because 'in seasons of insurrection or rebellion, there are often critical moments, when a welltimed offer of pardon to the insurgents or rebels may restore the tranquility of the commonwealth.'

"And, Fox ruled, the period from the Watergate burglary in June, 1972, until Nixon's resignation in August, 1974, was a 'season of insurrection or rebellion by many actually in the government."
