Korff - Undated story.

Korff, opening his fund-raising appeal in Dallas, says Nixon's bank account is less than \$2,000, the \$175,000 advance on his book is all but gone, etc.

"He said that Mr. Nixon was increasingly intent on the Quaker faith of his parents. 'When he recovers emotionally and physically,' Rabbi Korff said, 'my impression is he will be available for peace missions.'"

Nixon library - "More and more, it looks as if the new federal building in Laguna Niguel, Calif., may become the Richard Nixon presidential library.

"The latest information, developed by investigators for the General Accounting Office, reveals that the amount of space reserved for the Nixon papers has tripled in the last year to 60,000 feet.

"The GAO sleuths also learned that the government has plans to install a \$30,000 vault in the building. Congress last year rejected a request to install a \$110,000 safe to store Nixon papers and tapes. " (See entry 3 Oct 74, Nixon, tapes and documents.)

Operation Leprechaun - Article on Elsa Suarez Guitierrez and her work as an informer, and on the role of the informer in general. Author says that going by the rule of thumb that there are two informants for every full-time agent, there are something like 30,000 paid informants between the Treasury and Justice Departments alone.

China - From short item on visit to China by John Rhodes, Republican leader in the House of Representatives, and Carl Albert, House Speaker: "Chinese officials who have met with the two ... have shown no disposition to relent on their demand that the United States must abrogate its security treaty with Taiwan before establishing full diplomatic relations with Peking."

- From later item, in NYT's Notes on People: "Arriving in Hong Kong [no date] from Peking ... Albert said there could be no regular diplomatic relations between the United States and China 'under the present circumstances' but that Chinese leaders showed 'understanding and patience' concerning the American position on Taiwan." Albert and Rhodes and their party of 13 had been in China nine days.
