Butterfield (Nixon) - "Alexander Butterfield ... said [today in a telephone interview] he believes former President Nixon had prior knowledge of the first Watergate break-in. 'To have done something that big, he had to have given the OK. Once they had permission to do what they first did, then that was considered tacit approval to go back again.'

....
"Butterfield ... said he had no inside knowledge that Mr. Nixon was aware of the break-in plans. 'That is strictly a personal opinion based on a damn clear knowledge of the system - the way Nixon operated. After everything that has come out, people who think he didn't know about everything, they must not get him.'

"Butterfield said ... that he has had no communication with Mr. Nixon since the former president's resignation. 'I'm sure he hates me as much as anyone can,' Butterfield said. He said he feels sorry for Mr. Nixon's family, 'but I don't feel awful about the president's resignation. Not at all.'

"Butterfield said there was no question that his resignation from the FAA was forced. 'The White House acts as though it was voluntary, but I was asked to leave - and quickly,' he said."
