Liddy - Judge Sirica refuses to reduce Liddy's 20-year sentence because Liddy "had several opportunities to provide valuable assistance to governmental investigating units by testifying as to his knowledge of certain alleged illegal activities" but refused to do so, and because he has shown no "remorse or regret . . . contrition or sorrow" for his actions. Sirica also refuses to set aside a \$40,000 fine he had imposed on Liddy. There is no normal route for Liddy to appeal further the length of his sentence, according to several lawyers.

Story contrasts Sirica's treatment of Liddy with his treatment of Dean, Magruder, McCord and Kalmbach.

IRS - The IRS maintains a ^{computerized} master list of 466,442 names of individuals and organizations (NYT:) "under scrutiny" by the IRS. Rep. Andrew Maguire, a member of a House Government Operations subcommittee which is looking into improper enforcement activities, puts into the subcommittee's record a copy of a part of the index to this master list, thus making it public.

Donald C. Alexander, IRS commissioner, testifying before the subcommittee, says the appearance of the name of an individual or organization is not necessarily evidence of wrongdoing or suspected wrongdoing, that his own name is in the computer. NYT says that if the 172 names in the document made public by the subcommittee are typical of the entire computerized list, "then Mr. Alexander would be one of the few conservatives on the list. Like most of the Governmental lists of persons to be watched that were made during the Nixon Administration, today's list is dominated by liberals, radicals, antiwar activists and blacks." AMC-A

WXP says the list made public was mailed anonymously to the subcommittee by "an American who believes in the U.S. Constitution."
