Nixon (disbarment, NY?) - "Fifty Bronx and Manhattan lawyers were disbarred, suspended or censured during a 12-month period ending on April 30 - the highest number in history - according to a report released [today] by the grievance committee of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York.... [This grievance committee] has long been considered a model for other disciplinary agencies." AMP - A, C, E

Story says that some of the lawyers within this committee's jurisdiction who were involved in Watergate have already been disciplined, and the cases against others, including former President Richard M. Nixon, are pending."
