Demos Limiting GOP Observers

Miami Beach, Fla.

Democratic national convention manager Richard J. Murphy said yesterday he has notified the Nixon administration he will bar all politically appointed observers from the Justice and Treasury Departments from the convention hall.

Murphy said he does not want administration operatives "whose careers depend on a Republican victory next fall" taking part in the Democratic convention which opens Monday.

He said he relayed word of the ban to the administration through the Secret Service

and Miami Beach police chief Rocky Pomerance.

Murphy said he would welcome any and all career administration personnel at the convention and said they could have any kind of credentials they need. But he said he wanted persons appointed by the President to stay away.

The Nixon Administration, through the Justice Department, planned to station security officers in the convention hall who would make decisions on the degree of force needed in case of any disruption.

Asked whether his decision was motivated by the

break-in at Democratic national headquarters in Washington, Murphy said, "that certainly plays a large part."

Murphy said ten days before the break-in one of the men implicated in the raid, who is now a fugitive, was in the Democratic headquarters hotel in Miami Beach.

"I don't want them in the command post and I don't want them in the hall with what's been going on," Murphy said. "It is inappropriate and I will not stand for it."

He took pains to make a distinction between the Justice Department and the Se-

cret Service, giving the Secret Service high marks for cooperation.

In contrast, he said, Justice Department officials, who have been in Miami Beach for some time, never have "had the courtesy" to contact him.
