

Kleindienst Asks:

'4 More Years'

Four years more of Nixon Administration will assure everybody's civil rights and beat organized crime, U.S. Attorney General Richard Kleindienst assured a group of Bay Area attorneys.

Addressing the Marin County Bar Association yesterday on what he said was a nationwide tour of "non-political" speeches, Kleindienst ticked off those achievements of his department in the past three and half years:

- Over 1600 indictments in organized crime cases, including half of the crime leadership, with the help of 700 court-sanctioned wire-taps.

"Give us four more years and we'll bring the problem of organized crime down to the ordinary irritant level."

- A tripling of the number of civil right complaints filed and a 90 percent integration of schools in southern states.

"In fact, schools there (in the South) are now more integrated than in San Francisco."

About his predecessor, Ramsey Clark, attorney general under President Johnson, Kleindienst said he should have been a case worker for the Department of Health, Education and

Welfare because he tended to look more toward long range solutions than enforcing the law.

Kleindienst said very little about the Watergate case beyond noting "one of the most reprehensible things in a free society is to have one person invade the privacy of another" and should be prosecuted to the full extent of the law.

His silence on the Watergate case, Kleindienst stressed, was forced by a court order obtained by the Democratic Party prohibiting anyone in his department from discussing the case.
