Demo Leader Would Jail Mitchell, Stans

-WASHINGTON - (UPI) - If John Mitchell and Maurice Stans knew in advance about the break-in and bugging at the Democratic headquarters last spring "then they should go to jail like any other lawbreakers in this country," Democratic National Chairwoman Jean Westwood said today.

If they did not know, she added, then "the President is running one of the most irresponsible political organizations in history" in which money is disbursed to people to do anything they please with it.

2 Weeks After

Mitchell's resignation as chairman of the Committee to Re-elect the President

Stans, former Secretary of Commerce, is the financial chairman of Nixon's reelection committee, and some of the money found in the bank account of one of the arrested suspects passed through his office.

Both men have denied any advance knowledge of the incident.

No Release

The White House meanwhile, said today it has no plans to release a report of its investigation to determine whether White House staff members or other government officials were involved in the break-in.

Asked if the report would be released, White House Press Secretary Ronald Ziegler replied, "We have no plans to do that."

Martha

During a speech to the National Press Club, Mrs. Westwood was asked if she believed Mrs. Martha Mitchell had persuaded her husband to resign because of the Watergate incident.

"Probably it was not Martha who made John quit the Republican campaign because of the Watergate bugging," Mrs. Westwood smiled. "Probably she was much relieved that it gave them an excuse to fire him."
