ALBUQUERQUE, N. M. AP - Men working for the Committee for the Re-election of the President were foiled in an effort to break

into Sen. McGovern's old campaign headquarters, the Democratic presidential nominee said Saturday.

The break-in was attempted during the early morning of May 27, but was aborted after McGovern's campaign workers and a person sleeping in the doorway scared them off, McGovern told a news

conference.

**There's no question in mind that they were connected with the Committee to Re-elect the President, " McGovern said.

Campaign chairman Lawrence F. O'Brien Friday reported the alleged break-in effort and told a news conference its purpose was to

plant listening devices. Saturday's remarks were McGovern's first public comments on the matter.

The alleged bugging attempt would have occurred less than a month prior to the June 17 break-in of the Democratic National Committee headquarters at the Watergate Hotel.

McGovern, in New Mexico for a rest following his first hectic week of full time campaigning for the White House, said President Nixon treats the Watergate bugging "as a kind of caper."

**It's more than that, " McGovern said, "It's an apparent crime. That kind of crime has some people in the penitentiary. 99
McGovern says he knows who attempted the alleged May 27
break-in. We have the information from a source that was very close to what was happening that night, , he said.

But, McGovern said, he has no plans to make the data public.

McGovern did not charge that a crime in fact had actually been committed. He said two carloads of men planning to burglarize and bug his Capitol Hill campaign office—from which he has since moved-left after they were apparently spotted by McGovern workers and a person sleeping in the doorway.

McGovern reiterated his call for President Nixon to appoint a

special non-government investigator to probe the Watergate burglary as well as the alleged attempt on his campaign headquarters.
