Kennedy Weighs 'Spy' Probe 15 Oct 72

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.) is considering hold ing public hearings by his own subcommittee into alleged political espionage activities by Republicans, and he has won approval from the subcommittee's Democratic majority to subpoena witnesses.
