Magazine Ties Nixon Aide to

New York

Time magazine said yesterday that Dwight Chapin, deputy assistant to President Nixon, has admitted to the FBI that he had hired Los Angeles lawyer Donald H. Segretti to disrupt Democratic

presidential campaigns.

The magazine said its information came from unnamed Justice Department officials.

Last week, Clark MacGregor, director of the Committee for the Re-election of the President, denied that Chap-

in was involved or knew about efforts to disrupt Democratic campaigns.

The magazine said it learned that Chapin told the FBI that Segretti's payment was set by California lawyer Herbert Kalmbach, Mr. Nixon's personal attorney.

It said Kalmbach admitted to the FBI that the money he paid to Segretti came from cash kept in the office of Maurice H. Stans, finance chairman of the Committee to Re-elect the President.

Segretti, a former Treas-

ury Department attorney who now has a private law practice in California, has been identified in various published reports as having been hired by two White House aides to recruit operatives in an alleged scheme to sabotage the

campaigns of Democratic presidential hopefuls.

In an earlier report, Time said Segretti received \$35,000 from Kalmbach between September 1971 and March 1972 to disrupt primary campaigns, using such tactics as harassing telephone calls.
