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Segretti LOS ANGELES AP - Don-ald H. Segretti, who droppe out of sight when the news media began linking him to aldropped leged attempts to harass and disrupt Democratic campaigns, is back in his \$240-a-month apartment. His \$6,000 Mercedes coupe is again parked in a garage below the apartment.

The Los Angeles attorney is considering telling his side of the story, but not for a while, according to a Los Angeles Times newsman.

Segretti shed no light on the mystery surrounding news reports of political espionage during the presidential campaign
in two conversations with a Los
Angeles Times newsman last

week.

Segretti's answer to whether he had been in contact with administration officials since his return to his Marina Del Rey apartment and other similar questions:

have no comment that. 99

Segretti, 31, returned to the apartment Nov. 10.

News reports published Oct. O and thereafter told o 10 and thereafter told of at least six persons who said Segretti had tried to recruit them as undercover undercover agents to disrupt Democratic primary campaigns and collect information the can-didates for the Republican par-

ty. Segretti couldn't be reached then for comment on the reports.

Time magazine, citing information in Justice Department files, reported that werbert W.

files, reported that Herbert W. Kalmbach, a close associate of President Nixon, paid Segretti more than \$35,000.

Telephone records linked Segretti's name to telephone calls to the White House, the home of Nixon's appointments secretary, Dwight L. Chapin, and the unlisted office phone of E. Howard Hunt Jr., one of the seven Watergate bugging defendants. The calls were made

fendants. The calls were made from Segretti's phone or billed to his credit card.

In conservations last Monday and Friday, Segretti told a reporter he would consider telling his story in tape-recorded interviews. But he said he would not decide for some time.

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
