Jet Crash Victim Heavily Insured

Mrs. E. Howard Hunt Jr., who died in Friday's air crash here, was insured for \$225,000, sources in Washington said yesterday.

The heavy flight insurance is under investigation by the U.S. Attorney's office, which is involved in prosecution of the bugging case, the sources said.

Whether her husband or the couple's four children were listed as beneficiaries of Mrs. Hunt's flight insurance could not be learned. The insurance was purchased for \$7.50 at Washington's National Airport.

Hunt, a former consultant

to the Nixon administration, was one of seven men indicted earlier this year for conspiring to obtain information by illegal means from Democratic national headquarters at the Watergate complex in Washington, D.C.

The insurance on Mrs. Hunt's life was purchased for \$7.50 at Washington's National Airport. Tele-trip Co., Inc., which sold the insurance, allows passengers to buy a maximum of \$300,-000 coverage.

Mrs. Hunt had carried \$10,585.36 in cash on board the flight. That money was put in a safe deposit box by the Cook county coroner.
