Dean denied this yesterday through White House spokes-man Warren, who added that Dean did not have the infor-mation about the Hoback in-She told a reporter Monday, "You do something in confi-dence and it shatters you a lit-tle to learn it's been broken." She said she did not know who broke that confidence.
