Nixon Popularity Drops in Poll

The latest survey, completed prior to Mr. Nixon's announcement last Tuesday that "major developments" had come to light in the Watergate case, shows 54 per cent of Americans approving of the way he is handling his job, 36 per cent disapproving and 10 per cent undecided.

The previous survey, conducted between March 30 and April 2, showed Mr. Nixon with a 59 per cent approval rate.

While Watergate appears to be an important factor in the President's declining popularity, others can also be cited — for example, con-cern over high prices. Some decline, however, could be expected with the Vietnam peace settlement now less prominent in people's thinking and the nation's attention focusing on domestic problems.

Watergate has developed into an issue that is familiar reveals corruption in the Nixon administration. Furthermore, 4 persons in 10 express the belief that Mr. Nixon knew about the Watergate situation in advance.

A significant relationship is found between attitudes on Mr. Nixon's handling of his job and attitudes on Wat-

ergate.

Among persons who approve of Mr. Nixon's overall performance in office, opinion is 4 to 1 on the side that Watergate affair is "just politics - the kind of thing that both parties engage in.

In sharp contrast, among those who disapprove of the way Mr. Nixon is handling his job, opinion is 5 to 2 on the side that Watergate is a serious matter, revealing corruption in the Nixon administration.

Evidence that Watergate could spell serious trouble for the GOP in the Congressional races next year is shown by the fact that, not only 4 in 10 Democrats, but as many as one-third of independents think Watergate is a serious matter, revealing corruption in the Nixon administration. Thirteen per cent of Republicans share this view.

In light of these findings, it is interesting to note that Mr. Nixon's popularity rat-ing is down 16 points among independents since January, 13 points among Democrats and 6 points among his fellow Republicans.
