A member of the Nixon Cabinet said yesterday the tional Dictionary defines Watergate case is an "es-sentially ephemeral" mat-ter, which will not dam-age the credibility of the President or impede the work of his administra-tion

tion. Secretary of Health, Edu-cation and Welfare Casper W. Weinberger said he is not wasting time worrying about the political espionage charges, because "pursuing our business as usual is vastly more important than getting involved in essentially ephemeral matters."

Weinberger's breakfast press conference was the first public appearance by a cabinet member since Mr. Nixon told a cabinet session on Friday that he was taking personal responsibility for clearing up the charges against high officials of the White House staff. administration

Weinberger, a political as-

sociate of Mr. Nixon for two decades, declined to give de-tails of the cabinet meeting, but said: "I trust the Presi-dent. He said he had no prior knowledge of the bugging, and I trust the Presi-dent."

"I don't think it goes to the credibility of the Presi-dent at all," he added.

The former budget director conceded that "anything in politics that has to be explained is bad. No party welcomes a series of events that has to be explained as much as this one."
