POST 4/3W 73 Nixon Secluded At Camp David

CAMP DAVID, Md., April 29 (AP)—President Nixon remained secluded today at his mountaintop retreat as pressure grew for action on the Watergate case.

Reliable sources said that Mr. Nixon was no longer alone at the camp 75 miles northwest of Washington—that he had been joined by a small cadre of advisers. But the White House refused to divulge any information on Mr. Nixon's activities.

"The President is spendrine fresident is spending a private weekend at Camp David and I cannot provide information at this time," said deputy White House press secretary Gerald L. Warren.

Mrs. Jill Ruckelshaus, speaking at a conference of the American Association of University Women on Saturday at Fort Wayne, Ind., told newsmen a legal study is being conducted to see if her husband William can be acting FBI chief and head of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency at the same time.

"If he can't hold both positions," she said, "I don't think he will go

back to the EPA after the FBI job is over."

A White House spokesman said Friday that Ruckelshaus would resign the EPA post and that an acting administrator would be named in his place. He said the law prohibits a person from holding two federal jobs at the same time.
