U.S. Court Calls Martha

WASHINGTON — (UPI) — Martha Mitchell, wife of former Attorney General John Mitchell, has been subpoenaed to give sworn testimony tomorrow about what she knows about the Watergate case, it was learned today.

The subpoena was issued by a federal court in New York in response to a request by lawyers for convicted Watergate conspirator James W. McCord Jr.

McCord provided bodyguards for Mrs. Mitchell during the early months of

President Nixon's re-election campaign last year and checked her apartment for possible electronic bugs.

A friend of Mrs. Mitchell asked her whether she was carefully going over what she would say.

"No, I'm just going to tell the truth," the friend quoted Mrs. Mitchell as replying.

An attorney for McCord said Mrs. Mitchell's testimony would be taken in New York as a deposition by lawyers in a \$6.4 million civil damage suit the Democratic party is pressing against McCord and other principals

in the Watergate case.

Mitchell, one of the those being investigated by the Watergate grand jury, resigned as Nixon's campaign manager two weeks after the June 17 Watergate raid after his wife threatened publicly to leave him unless he got out of the "dirty business" of politics.

"Mrs. Mitchell is a very bright and very articulate woman," Henry B. Rothblatt, an attorney for McCord, said today. "We're sure she will be able to give us a lot of information that will help us."
