Hunt Says Nixon Aide  
 Ordered Break-In at  
 Doctor's Office

LOS ANGELES, May 4—  
 E. Howard Hunt Jr. and G. Gordon Liddy "cased" the office of Dr. Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist and then returned to Washington, where they were ordered to break into it, according to testimony from the Watergate grand jury released today at the Pentagon papers trial.

According to the defense in the Pentagon papers case, which late this afternoon was given a copy of Hunt's testimony, Hunt told the grand jury that the order to break in had come from Egil Krogh Jr., then a White House staff member.

The defense also said that Hunt told the grand jury that, at the behest of Mr. Krogh, the Central Intelligence Agency had provided him with a camera to be used in examining the psychiatrist's office. He also said that he had been given false identification papers to be used on his trips to the Los Angeles area.

**Supervised by 2 Men**

The operation was supervised at all times by Mr. Krogh and David Young, who at that time was a staff member of the National Security Council, according to the grand jury testimony.

In another development, Judge William Matthew Byrne Jr. denied a defense motion to dismiss the case against Dr. Ellsberg and Anthony J. Russo Jr. on the ground of misconduct on the part of the Government.

The motion was made because the judge was invited to see Sen. Clemente on April 5 to discuss with John D. Ehrlichman, then a top Nixon aide, the possibility of becoming director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

In ruling on the motion, the judge said: "I am convinced beyond any doubt at all that nothing has compromised my ability to act as a fair and impartial judge in this case."

**No Dates Given**

No dates were released for the "casing" of the Beverly Hills physician's office, but Hunt said that he and Liddy

had taken photographs of the office and drawn diagrams of it.

In the grand jury testimony of Wednesday, Hunt said that after receiving permission for the break-in, he and Liddy returned to Beverly Hills with two Cuban exiles.

The testimony said that the Cubans had committed the break-in along with Bernard L. Barker, a former Central In-

telligence Agency agent, who also led the Watergate break-in.

Hunt testified that on the evening of the break-in, he stationed himself outside the home of Dr. Lewis J. Fielding, Dr. Ellsberg's psychiatrist, while Liddy drove around the neighborhood. The two of them, he said, were there to make sure that Dr. Fielding did not leave his home while the break-in was occurring.
