NIXON AIDE DEFENDS

WASHINGTON, May 8 (UPI)

— An Assistant Attorney General testified today that President Nixon could invoke executive privilege even in a proceeding involving his own impeachment. peachment.

But Robert G. Dixon Jr., Justice Department legal counsel, quickly added that invoking the

quickly added that invoking the privilege "could contribute adversely to the executive's success" in such a proceeding.

Support was being sought in the House by Representatives John E. Moss of California, and Bella S. Abzug of Manhattan, both Democrats, for a resolution to form a committee of intion to form a committee of in-quiry into the Watergate case and other instances of alleged campaign espionage as a first step that could lead to impeachment proceedings.

Mr. Dixon appeared before a House Government Operations House Government Operations subcommittee to announce the Administration's opposition to proposed changes in the Freedom of Information Act, some of which he said would "repeal the doctrine of executive privilege" — the presumed right of the executive branch to refuse the executive branch to refuse to divulge information.
