## Text of Krogh's Letter of Resignation

WASHINGTON, May 9-Following is the text of a let-Following is the text of a let-ter of resignation submitted this morning to President Nixon by Egil Krogh Jr., Un-der Secretary of Transporta-tion and former White House aide who has become aide who has become impli-cated in the 1971 burglary of the office of Dr. Daniel Ells-berg's psychiatrist:

berg's psychiatrist: As I have confirmed in an affidavit filed with the U.S. District Court in Los Angeles, I agreed to a certain mission by employes of the special investigating unit which op-erated under my direction from the White House in 1971. As the sworn state-ment makes clear agreement

from the white house in 1971. As the sworn state-ment makes clear, agreement to this mission was my re-sponsibility, a step taken in excess of instructions, and without the knowledge or permission of any superior. Under the circumstances which prevailed in the sum-mer of 1971, and based on the best information avail-able to me at the time, I be-lieved that my decision was dictated inescapably by the vital, national security inter-ests of the United States. I now see that this judg-ment may well have been in error, though prompted by what was then my highest

sense of right. Its consequences, to my eternal re-

quences, to my eternal re-gret, have proved injurious both to a number of innocent persons and to that rever-ence for law on which our society is founded. My overriding desire now is to accept full responsi-bility for my acts and deci-sion and to assist in bring-ing all the facts and circum-stances into the open so that a fair judgment of this ac-

a fair judgment of this ac-tivity can be rendered. With public confidence in our Government already shaken by the Watergate af-fair, and with the complete affirmation of your proceed. affirmation of your personal integrity so imperative at this time, I cannot remain in the Administration while my role in the special investigat-ing unit is submitted to the

ing unit is submitted to the legal scrutiny it must now properly receive. It is right that the men and women of the Depart-ment of Transportation have an Under Secretary who en-joys full public trust and can devote full time to his job. It is for these reasons that I submit my resigna-tion as Under Secretary of Transportation. Transportation.

Th opportunity I have had to participate in your Admin-istration during the past four

years has been th greatest experience of my life. In particular, it was rewarding for me as a member of your for me as a member of your staff to have a hand in the estblishment of your global prgroam to combat nar<sup>c</sup>otics and drug abuse nd to work closely with the people of the District of Columbia during this period of great progress for the city. My service at the De-partment of Transportation

partment of Transportation, though brief, has also brought priceless lessons and friend-ships with many superb public servants whom you can be proud to have on your

Ic servants whom you can be proud to have on your team. I leave the Government with great reluctance and sadness at the conclusion of a chapter that has meant so much, but also with the sin-cere hope that my actions in the coming days will contri-bute to the inexorable pro-cess of healing in which our country is now caught up. Truth alone can bring the haling and mak emen free, and as best I can I am mak-ing truth my guide. I am grateful beyond words for the privilege of serving with you, and would welcome any occasion the future might bring for me to assist you personally or to re-enter the service of the United States.
