Mitchell and Stans Indictments Recall Teapot Dome Charges

WASHINGTON, May 11 (AP)
—The indictments of two former members of President Nixon's Cabinet are only the third and fourth in United States history for Cabinet members charged in connection with their official or political duties.

The first two resulted from the Teapot Dome scandal in the Administration of Warren G. Harding.

Yesterday, former Attorney General John N. Mitchell and former Commerce Secretary Maurice H. Stans were indicted on charges stemming from a contribution to President Nixon's re-election campaign.

Albert B. Fall, Secretary of the Interior in President Harding's Administration, is the only member of a Cabinet ever indicted, tried and sent to jail. He was sentenced to a year and fined \$100,000 after being convicted of accepting a bribe in the Teapot Dome scandal.

Fall engineered the transfer of naval oil reserves to his department and then leased them to two big oil companies. In return, he received almost \$400,000 in "loans."
