Four Congressmen defended the late J. Edgar Hoover yesterday against "scurrilous remarks" attributed to a former FBI official in a published in-terview Tuesday.

The Los Angeles Times had quoted William H. Sulli-

van, whom Hoover forced to resign as assistant FBI director in 1971, as saying Hoover "wasn't of sound mind" and "was no longer rational."

Representatives Robert L. F. Sikes (Dem-Fla.), John J.

Flynt Jr. (Dem-Ga.), and John M. Slack (Dem-Va.), all members of an appropriall members of an appropri-ations subcommittee, said they were among the last congressmen to talk with Hoover. Joining them was Representative Samuel L. Devine (Rep-Ohio) an ex-FBI agent.

Hoover appeared before the subcommittee March 2, 1972, about two months before his death, the three congressmen said, and appeared to them to be very

stable.
