The former teamster official, released from Federal prison on executive elemency from President Nixon after serving more than four years for jury tampering, equated the media's role in Watergate with his own trial and subsequent incraceration.

He said the media had invaded his privacy and exaggerated the facts, relying much on hearsay, "the same as they are doing now in Watergate."
