Federal Judge John M. Canella imposed no prison term on the 70-year-old senior part-ner in the Wall Street investment firm of Loeb, Rhoades & Co. He could have gotten three years.

"I can only repeat that the violation was totally innocent and unwitting," Loeb told the judge about the disguised contributions tributions.

It was the first prosecution under a federal law that became effective April 7, 1972.
