Howard Hunt Cites Shakespeare, Tells Newsmen 'I'm Cinna the Poet'

LOS ANGELES, June 8 (UPI)—E. Howard Hunt briefly free from a federal prison to testify before a grand jury here, told a mob of newsmen yesterday:
"I am not Cinna the Conspirator. I am Cinna the Poet."

Poet."

That left most of the reporters baffled, and some weren't sure what he said.

Hunt, who pleaded guilty in the break-in of Demo-cratic Party headquarters

last June, wrote and published more than 30 spy novels during his days as a CIA agent. He was apparently referring to a scene in Shakespeare's "Julius Caesar" in which the murdered Caesar is at the feet of Marc Antony and Antony in-Antony, and Antony in-flames the mob to revenge with the speech that begins "Friends, Romans, countryand Antony inmen."

When he finishes, a poet named Cinna enters the

scene, and the enraged mob kills him because he has the same name as one of the conspirators.

"Cinna the poet was an innocent bystander, a little man who was the victim of a politician's clever oratory and a bloody minded public determined to get revenge and damn the details," said a college English professor.

He added:
"Mr. Hunt seems to be trying to tell us something."
