Watergate Hurt McGovern, Former Party Chief Says Special to The New York Times

Jean Westwood, the former chairman of the Democratic National Committee, has said that she believes Senator George McGovern would "very definitely" have had a better chance of winning the Presidency last year if the Watergate break-in and related incidents of sabotage had not taken place.

Mrs. Westwood, who headed the national committee during Senator McGovern's campaign, gave this opinion in a deposition in the three civil suits growing out of the Watergate incident in which the national committee is now involved.

Earlier in her 96-page statement, Mrs. Westwood was questioned about the response of the Federal Bureau of Investigation to the discovery, in September, 1973, of a bug on the telephone of R. Spencer Oliver, a national committee staff member. She said that "the F.B.I.'s attitude at that point was that someone in our campaign must have put it there."
