

David Eisenhower Puts Off Politics for Now

"I have no plans for politics right now. If the right time and the right place come together, I might run for office." So said 25-year-old **David Eisenhower**, responding to speculation he might covet Pennsylvania's 19th Congressional District seat, now held by **George A. Goodling**, the 76-year-old Republican, who is keeping his own plans to himself. "I am not seeking his seat," said Mr. Eisenhower. "I am concentrating on the business at hand—writing sports for *The Philadelphia Bulletin*. In the fall, I shall decide whether to continue as a sports writer or go to law school."

In an active day on the diplomatic front, President Nixon announced plans to nominate **William D. Brewer**, a career Foreign Service officer, to be Ambassador to the Democratic Republic of Sudan, succeeding **Cleo A. Noel Jr.**, who was assassinated March 2. In addition, he plans to name **Richard F. Pedersen** of the State Department to succeed **Alfred Pulhan**, who has resigned his post as Ambassador to Hungary. In Washington, mean-

while, the Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved the nominations of **John H. Crimmins** to be Ambassador to Brazil and **Ernest V. Siracusa** to be Ambassador to Uruguay.

Inaugurating a beautification program in White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., Mrs. Robb said her mother's interest in highway beautification has not abated, and she is now in-

involved in a tree-planting program near Austin, Tex. "To give a tree is to make a commitment," said Mrs. Robb. "It's not an impersonal gift. It gives you a stake in the future."

After demonstrations in Canada and during a brief stopover in London for a meeting with Prime Minister **Edward Heath**, **Indira Gandhi**, the Prime Minister of India, headed for New Delhi and her bullet-pocked home. A police security guard posted inside the house accidentally fired his automatic rifle, spraying nine bullets around the premises before he could remove his finger from the trigger.

Among the avid followers of the Watergate hearings involving the Administration of his old-time antagonist, **Richard Nixon**, is **Alger Hiss**, who was convicted of perjury in 1950 in a controversial case. "They did the same thing to me that the Administration did in Watergate," he said. "I know they wiretapped me, but at the time people didn't think it was bad. And they tried the case with leaks and innuendoes in the press. In a way that's ironic, because now it's being used against them."

Addressing a conference of women journalists in Jerusalem following her decision to stand for office again in October, Mrs. Meir jokingly asserted: "One of the reasons that made me decide to remain in office was that my place would have been taken by a man."
