Blagden H. Wharton, treasurer of a Republican fund-raising committee in Maryland, pleaded not guilty Monday to charges that he filed false financial reports on a dinner honoring Vice President Agnew.

Mr. Wharton was released in his own recognizance by Chief Judge Matthew S. Evans of the Anne Arundel County Circuit Court, who set a trial for Sept. 19.

The charges against Mr. Wharton, a vice president of the Maryland National Bank, grew out of disclosures at the Senate Watergate hearings that the Finance Committee to reelect the President had lent the Maryland Committee \$50,000.

Mr. Wharton and Alexander M. Lankler, the state Republican chairman, have acknowledged in interviews that the money was falsely listed in reports to the Maryland election board as 32 contributions, Mr. Lankler said that this was done to create an inflated impression of financial support for the May, 1972, dinner honoring the Vice President. The money raised was used in the Presidential and Maryland Congressional campaigns.
