

# WATERGATE DATA SOUGHT ON COAST

Prosecutor Sees Cox Aides  
to Discuss Documents

LOS ANGELES, June 26—  
Local prosecutors will seek a Federal court order to secure documents that are said to implicate John D. Ehrlichman in the planning of the break-in at the office of Dr. Daniel Ellsberg's former psychiatrist. District Attorney Joseph P. Busch of Los Angeles County met here yesterday with two top aides of Archibald Cox, the special Watergate prose-

cutor, to discuss the documents, which have already been introduced before a Washington grand jury.

Since the documents are thus protected by the secrecy of the grand jury, it was decided that a court order was needed to transfer copies to Los Angeles, Mr. Busch told reporters.

The principal document sought by Mr. Busch is said to be a memorandum outlining plans for the break-in, which took place on Sept. 3, 1971. David R. Young Jr., a former member of the "plumbers," the White House unit that authorized the intrusion, has reportedly testified in Washington that Mr. Ehrlichman saw the memo and approved the illegal entry.

### Pleaded the Fifth

Mr. Young testified in Washington under a grant of immunity, but he was not given immunity here and pleaded the

Fifth Amendment before the grand jury on June 14.

Mr. Ehrlichman, formerly Mr. Nixon's chief domestic adviser, has admitted approving "some sort of proposal" involving Dr. Ellsberg, the former Defense Department consultant who made the Pentagon Papers available to the news media. But he has repeatedly denied precise knowledge of the break-in plans.

The distinction is important, because it could determine whether the grand jury here decides to indict Mr. Ehrlichman for conspiracy to commit the break-in. The prosecutors are eager to get the Young memorandum because it could provide a rebuttal of Mr. Ehrlichman's denials.

This legal maneuvering came as John W. Dean 3d testified in Washington that he had been told that the decision to bur-

glarize the office of Dr. Ellsberg's psychiatrist was made in the Oval Office of President Nixon.

In his appearance yesterday before the Senate Watergate Committee, Mr. Dean said that the comment had come from Egil Krogh Jr., the chief of the "plumbers" operation. "I was so surprised to hear this that I said, 'You must be kidding,'" Mr. Dean testified. "And he repeated again that he had received his instructions out of the Oval Office."

Mr. Krogh is scheduled to testify here on July 5.

### Numbers Figure Sentenced

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 26 (AP) Anthony Grosso, convicted in Federal court of running a \$30-million-a-year western Pennsylvania numbers empire, was given a 10-year prison sentence yesterday.
