

Maryland Man Is '71 Picket Cited by Dean

BALTIMORE, June 26 (AP)—A Baltimore area school teacher is the man whom former White House Counsel John Dean III said angered President Nixon by picketing outside the White House in 1971.

According to published reports, the man, unidentified by Dean in his testimony before the Senate Watergate committee, was Monroe Cornish.

The reports said Cornish admitted he was the man Dean was talking about and said he picketed the White House every weekend during the fall and winter of 1971 and was asked to move each time by Secret Service, FBI and D.C. policemen.

One report said that a Secret Service spokesman confirmed the identity of Cornish as the man Dean mentioned.

Cornish, a world history teacher at Northeast High School in Anne Arundel County, was a candidate for mayor in 1971, for Congress in 1972 and for the vacant First Congressional District seat this year.

Soviet Citizenship Law

MOSCOW, June 26 (UPI)—The Presidium of the Supreme Soviet (Parliament) has ordered its legislative commissions to draft a new law on Soviet citizenship, the Tass news agency said yesterday. The new statute would replace the existing law adopted in 1938 which "does not cover all the problems that come up at the present time," Tass said.
