But the Republican Senator from Connecticut said at a news conference in Bridgeport that he hoped that Mr. Nixon would voluntarily testify before the committee.

The committee is taking this week off, following five exhausting days of testimony by John W. Dean 3d in which the former White House counsel contended that President Nixon took part in covering up the facts surrounding the Watergate burglary at Democratic national headquarters in June, 1972 1972.
