Presidential counsel Leonard Garment told Senate investigators yes-terday the White House needs more time to con-sider their request for files relating to the Watergate scandal.

Samuel Dash, chief counsel to the Senate Watergate committee, said Garment cited the massive number of documents the committee wants to examine and photocopy.

Among the documents are the files of former presidential aides and news summaries of the Watergate case that were given to President

from the news summaries, for followup action by his aides.
