Ehrlichman has already made arrangements to lease his family's old home on Hunt's Point on the east side of Lake Washington, the source said and added: "He plans to be here by Aug. 1." Ehrlichman was a Seattle zoning lawyer before he joined Nixon's 1968 presidential campaign.

He has been quoted as saying he will stay in Washington, D.C. only until he has testified before the Senate Watergate committee headed by Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr. (D-N.C.).
