Probe Set To Question Egil Krogh

LOS ANGELES, July 4 (AP)
—Former White House aide
Egil Krogh Jr. is scheduled to
appear Thursday before a
grand jury probing the burglary of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist's office.

But a district attorney's spokesman says there are indications that Krogh will refuse to testify about the burglary and invoke Fifth Amendment protection against self-incrimation.

No other witnesses have been scheduled, and it is probably that District Attorney Joseph Busch will conclude his presentation to the grand jury shortly after Krogh's appearance.

Krogh, a former assistant to then presidential adviser John D. Ehrlichman, submitted a sworn affidavit to the Pentagon Papers trial judge last May admitting his own role in authorizing the break-in to get Ellsberg's psychiatric records.

Krogh and another former White House aide, David Young, have been identified as, the men who headed the secret White House "plumbers' squad," created to investigate the leak of classified information.

The county grand jury is seeking to establish whether there is evidence to bring charges of burglary, conspiracy to commit burglary or trespassing.
