"Maybe he thinks we need a Watergate here," Mr. Figueres said of Mr. Duran in a state-ment delivered to newsmen fol-lowing a newspaper article listing Mr. Fernandez Duran's charges against the President. Mr. Figueres said he wrote a draft for Mr. Vesco before the financier went on national television. Mr. Fernandez Duran dis-played at a news conference Monday what he said were copies of a manuscript Mr. Figueres wrote one day before Mr. eVsco made the speech de-fending his controversial Costa, Rican investments. At his own meeting with the press, Mr. Figueres congratu-lated the attorney for "dis-covering that I am helping in-vestors to transfer their capital to Costa Rica." Mr. Vesco, 37 years old, is under criminal indictment in New York on charges of trying to influence a Securities and Exchange Commission investi-gation with a \$200,000 contri-bution to President Nixon's 1972 campaign fund. Mr. Vesco failed to appear in a New York court last month to answer the indictment, and Costa Rican courts have refused to extra-dite him. dite him.
