## Goldwater on Glass Houses

## Washington

Senator Barry M. Goldwater (Rep-Ariz.) told Senator Edward M. Kennedy (Dem-Mass.) yesterday to stop "moralizing" about the Watergate scandal until all the facts about Chappaquidick are known.

"... People who live in glass houses should not throw stones," Goldwater said in a speech to the Young Republican National Convention in Atlanta. The text was released here.

The Arizona senator said, "the south had another visitor from the north recently when Senator Edward Kennedy celebrated the Fourth of July in Decatur, Ala., in an unlikely meeting with Governor George C. Wallace.

"In a speech which was obviously the opening gun of Kennedy's drive for the presidency in 1976, the senator constituted himself as both judge and jury in the Watergate affair."

Goldwater added, "I say that one does not have to excuse or condone any of the stupid illegalities of the Watergate affair to suggest that Senator Kennedy is the last person in the country to lecture us on such matters.

"Until all the facts involving the Chappaquidick tragedy are made known, the American people can do without moralizing from the Massachusetts Democrat.

"Oh, I know he is running for president, but that's no excuse," Goldwater added.

The "Chappaquidick tragedy" occurred four years ago when a car driven by Kennedy went off a small bridge at Chappaquidick, off the Massachusetts coast, and a passenger, Mary Jo Kopechne, drowned.
