

Javits Calls on Nixon To Aid Senate Probe

COOPERSTOWN, N.Y., July 16 (AP)—Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-N.Y.) called on President Nixon today to "take all possible steps to cooperate" with the Senate's Watergate investigation.

"Separation of powers notwithstanding — constitutional problems aside — I would say that we should and must have a reply from President Nixon to all the charges that have been made."

In his remarks prepared for the 12th executive conference of the New York State Broadcasters Association, Javits criticized the plan drafted in 1970 at the

direction of President Nixon that included the authorization for "breaking and entering" for reasons of national security. The plan reportedly was withdrawn shortly after its approval.

"That, as well as the charges of break-ins and burglaries, or laundered campaign funds and sabotage of potential political opponents, requires that explanations be made," Javits said.

"They can be made by only one person: the President of the United States, Richard M. Nixon."
