Special to The New York Times COOPERSTOWN, N.Y., July 17-Governor Rockefeller, an occasional visitor to the White House, said today he did not think it unusual that President Nixon had a network of secret tape recorders to take down conversa-

tions he had with visitors. "I've assumed that al-ways," he said, "with every President."

The Governor added that he did not think it's unusual" with Presidents or other public officials. But he said he did not have such a system in his own offices.

Pressed for comment on whether he might resent having been recorded by the President, Mr. Rockefeller indicated he did not but declinde further comment.

Talking to the State Broadcasters Association, the Governor treated the Watergate scandal in broad terms, as he has done for several months. He said it was evidence of the need for a moral re-awakening that went beyond the Republican party to the country at large.

"Maybe this is like the Old Testament," he said. "It was visited upon us and maybe we're going to benefit from it."
