

## San Jose, Costa Rica

The United States lost yesterday in its final bid to have financier Robert Vesco extradited from Costa Rica, where he fled while under a federal in-distance dictment.

A court here upheld a ruling by a judge last month that Vesco could not be extradited because an extradition treaty between the U.S. and Costa Rica did not apply

and Costa File dia house in his case. The U.S. government, in its application for extradi-tion, said Vesco had used the U.S. telegraphic system for attempted fraud. Accord-

ing to the extradition re-quest, Vesco had sent a ca-ble from the Bahamas to New York last year direct-ing the transfer of \$250,000 from his U.S. company's ac-count to his personal ac-count as expenses. The company refused to authorize the transfer.

Vesco, who is from New Jersey, is accused of having made an illegal \$200,000 con-tribution to President Nixon's re-election effort last year while his business activities were being investigated by the Securities and Exchange Commission. Indicted with him in the case were former Attorney Gen-

eral John Mitchell and former Commerce Secretary Maurice Stans. and any Reuters AV GEER
