Montoya recalled that a former aide to Haldeman, Gordon Strachan, when asked what advice he would give to young persons interested in a Government career, replied they should stay away.

Haldeman said Strachan's answer was "one of the saddest moments of this hear-ing." He said that he hoped Strachan would have given an opposite answer, as did former White House domestic adviser John D. Ehrlich-man who called on young people to "come and do better."

Asked by Montoya for his own advice, Haldeman said:

"My advice to any man or woman who feels that he or she has the ability and the interest to serve this country -in any way, he or she should pursue it to the fullest of their ability."

Haldeman said that his oldest son hopes to go to law school and seek a Govern-ment career. "I hope to God he enters Government service in some way," he said.

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
