Want Out Of Jail

DANBURY (Conn.) — (AP) — A lawyer for four men convicted in the Watergate break-in said yesterday that his clients are "rotting unknown in jail" while others involved in the case are "arranging speaking tours."

Ellis Rubin of Miami Beach said he had been retained by the four to seek privileges accorded to Jeb Stuart Magruder and Frederick C. LaRue. Both men have pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to obstruct justice in connection with the Watergate coverup.

"They have pleaded guilty and they are on the street arranging speaking tours throughout the country, but the four Cubans are rotting unknown in jail," Rubin said at a news conference outside the gates of the Federal Correctional Institution.

The four, Bernard L. Barker, Eugenio R. Martinez, Frank A. Sturgis and Virgilio Gonzalez, all from Miami, pleaded guilty along with E. Howard Hunt. Two others were convicted in the break-in.

Rubin said he had planned several legal steps, including a civil lawsuit against the Committee for the Re-election of the President.
