CENTREVILLE, Md., Aug. 18-Vice President Spiro T. Agnew drew repeated cheers and shouts of support here today as he declared at a politi-cal picnic, "I intend to fight to establish my innocence of any wrongdoing."

In his first public appearance in his home state since news broke that he is under federal investigation, Agnew drew an enthusiastic response from the crowd of 1,000 as he continued a sharp counterof-fensive against the voices of "gloom and despair" in America.

"What we need is hope and faith in America (and to) forget the masochistic (persons who are) constantly looking at all that is wrong," Agnew said.

Smiling and appearing tanned and relaxed, Agnew walked along a roped-off area and shook hands after his 10minute speech.
