## Why Nixon Was Vagu

President Nixon sat in the seclusion of Camp David a week ago, planning Watergate strategy.

With him was a staff "working paper," drafted to contain the basis of a point-by-point response to the charges against him the charges against him.

were already Aides putting out the word that the President would hand out a detailed "white paper" at the time of his televised Watergate address that would answer each accusation.

But some time before the

speech, Mr. Nixon scrapped the idea of a point-by-point response. In the solitude of Camp David he decided that it would not serve his interests to delve publicly into the specific details of the Watergate scandal that has shaken his presidency.

Why did Mr. Nixon back away from the strategy of a detailed, point by point response? Interviews with several of the President's senior advisers brought these explanations:

• "At first we thought it might be possible, to do something detailed and fairly definitive . . . but then it became clear that every answer he gave would simply

create more questions in turn, and it would go on and on and on."

• 'It became a question of what was the apprporiate level of detail for the President of the United States to adopt . . . a question of the appropriateness of getting into the pit."

• "He was worried that

it (a detailed response) would not end the matter . . . wor-ried that witnesses would then be called back at the hearings to be asked to respond."

A key factor in the President's decision to offer a broad brush response to the Watergate accusations was his conclusion that the public is tired of hearing about Watergate details day after day.

The White House commissioned no private poll on this subject, the advisers said, "It's just a sense of his," one senior White House man said.

Another said: "The feeling was that there was a shift taking place 'out there.' A shift to public ennui and public irritation with Watergate."

In essence, the Nixon men were saying, Mr Nixon of-fered the public no detailed explanation because he fig-ured he got off the hook without one.
