## Nixon to Blast Senate on Asia War

President Nixon breaks a six-week moratorium on public appearances today with a speech criticizing the Senate for what he calls its moves blocking his efforts to achieve a permanent peace in Southeast Asia. With his

address to a

Veterans of Foreign Wars convention in New Orleans, the President also will be embarking on a campaign to reassert his leadership in the wake of the Watergate scandal and he was reported ready to appeal for maintaining a strong defense posture in the post-Vietnam war period.

With him were his wife Pat and three of his aides chief of staff Alexander M. Haig Jr., press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler and speechwriter Patrick J. Buchanan.

The President's last public appearance outside of the White House was on July 9 when he spoke in Kansas

City, Mo., at swearing-in ceremonies for FBI director Clarence M. Kelley.

From New Orleans, Mr. Nixon will fly to California for a stay of about two weeks at his estate in San Clemente. While there, he is scheduled to hold his first news conference since March 15.
