

Meany: if Nixon defies Supreme Court, "Congress will have to impeach him"

Meany Talks Impeachment

WASHINGTON AFL-CIO president George Meany said yesterday Congress would have to impeach President Nixon if he defied a Supreme Court order to turn over his White House tapes on Watergate.

The 79-year-old union leader discussed Watergate and a wide range of other sub-jects at a 90-minute pre-Labor Day interview.

Meany, who has previously shied away from saying Nixon should be impeached or should resign because of Watergate, said any defiance of the Supreme Court by the President "would create a chaotic condition (and) I think the Congress

will have to impeach him."

Because of the Watergate affair, Meany said, "We now have a president that the American people, by and large, have lost confidence in.

Meany said he belie ed Nixon's uppermost concern "from the time he gets up in the morning until he goes to bed at night" is what he can do to better his image. But he predicted Nixon "will go down in history as one of our poorest presidents.

The labor leader, puffing

on his ever-present cigar, predicted the nation would have a recession by the end of the year. He also said unions will begin resorting to more strikes if prices continue to rise sharply whle wages are rigidly controlled.

The only solution, he said, is to let the nation return to completely free-market economy.

On other subjects, Meany said:

 Labor Secretary Peter Erennan probably would stay in office througout Nixon's second term and that the former union leader would be "just as effective as he has been this last six months — blah."
