A Report Cox Will Turn to Ellsberg Case

New York

CBS News reported yesterday that special Watergate prosecutor Archibald Cox is expected to ask this week for "a half dozen" indictments for conspiracy in the burglary of Daniel Ellsberg's psychiatrist's office.

CBS correspondent Daniel Schorr said he understands Cox will ask indictments against former presidential aide John Ehrlichman, Egil Krogh, G. Gordon Liddy, Bernard Baker, Eugenio Martinez, and Felipe DeDiego.

CBS said Cox, "stymied on the main Watergate in-

dictments until the Supreme Court decides on the presidential tapes, has decided to go ahead before a second grand jury" on the burglary case.

Ehrlichman and others already have been reported indicted in California in connection with the burglary. However, CBS said the new indictment request would not be concerned with burglary as a crime, since that is a violation of state laws, but on conspiracy "allegedly hatched in Washington" and on "the misuse of government agencies in getting CIA assistance."
